














SENIOR SCHOOL UPDATE

How are we nearly at the end of term 1? Just some key information from the senior school. **School Assessed Coursework (SAC)**

Students are well into their studies with many SAC's being completed. All SAC results and comments are uploaded to Compass 2 weeks after the assessment and can be viewed by students and parents. If a student receives an UG this means that the SAC does not meet requirements and will either need to be resat or an alternative assessment will need to be completed. Please speak to the teacher of the subject for more information.

If a student misses a scheduled SAC a medical certificate will need to be supplied to the school, and an alternative date organised for the student to receive a grade.

Elevate

On Monday the Year 12 students participated in an Elevate study skills session. This session focused on memory and mnemonics, helping student identify ways to improve their studying skills. A further session for Year 12's will be held later in the year focusing on exam preparation. A Year 11 session will also be held next term.






ART CLUB By Nakaiah, Nevaeh and Heidi



MIDDLE SCHOOL UPDATE








VET - Vocational Education Training

WHAT IT IS:

VET in schools allows secondary school students (typically Years 9-12) to undertake vocational training programs while still at school.

BENEFITS:

- Workplace Skills: Students gain practical skills and knowledge relevant to specific industries.
- Nationally Recognized Qualifications: VET courses lead to nationally recognized qualifications, which can be used for further education, training, or employment.
- Credits Towards School Qualifications: VET courses can provide credits towards the student's VCE and is a requirement of VCE-VM.
- Career Exploration: VET can help students explore different career pathways and gain an understanding of various industries.
- School-Based Apprenticeships and Traineeships: Students can also begin part-time school-based apprenticeships and traineeships.

VET COURSES ON OFFER @ YEA HIGH SCHOOL:

VET courses can cover a wide range of industries, including trades (e.g., plumbing, automotive, construction), business, health, and animal studies.

Certificate II Active Volunteering,
Certificate III Community Services and

DELIVERY:

VET courses can be delivered by schools themselves or by Registered Training Organisations (RTOS).

DUAL ACCREDITATION:

VET courses are often "dual-accredited," meaning they provide recognition towards both the school qualification and a nationally recognized VET qualification (TAFE).






Book profile

The Memory Police by Yoko Ogawa

Year 12 English text, <u>audiobook version available</u>
Shortlisted for the International Booker Prize 2020, an enthralling Orwellian novel about the terrors of state surveillance from one of Japan's greatest writers. Hat, ribbon, bird, rose. To the people on the island, a disappeared thing no longer has any meaning. It can be burned in the garden, thrown in the river or handed over to the Memory Police. Soon enough, the island forgets it ever existed. When a young novelist discovers that her editor is in danger of being taken away by the Memory Police, she desperately wants to save him.



For some reason, he doesn't forget, and it's becoming increasingly difficult for him to hide his memories. Who knows what will vanish next?
